Dear Friends,

Meg and I were blessed by a quiet, domestic vacation this summer. Having been traveling 90% of the time in our visits to churches in our former, non-geographical diocese, it was nice to be able to stay at home and do some long-overdue home projects. One of those neglected tasks was cleaning the garage and going through some old family papers, which had come from my parents' home many years ago. I learned that my great, great grandfather Jesse was the Superintendent of Congregationalist churches in lowa in the 1850's and 1860's. A little Google research turned up an online copy of a church history volume that included my ancestor's quarterly report to the churches. It seems that things really do run in families. I read these words:

"We have the following from the report of Superintendent Guernsey: 'I have this quarter travelled not less than three thousand miles; visited twenty-eight mission fields; attended four associational meetings and two councils; assisted in the dedication of one church; preached twelve times and made many other addresses."

It sounds familiar—except that he did it on horseback!

My great, great grandfather went on to highlight the laying of new railroads that would soon come to the state and he was passionate about the opportunities for sharing the Gospel and planting churches that were before them. He exhorted the church leaders, saying, "A field promising a richer harvest it would be difficult to find."

That, too, sounds very familiar. At the launch of our new diocese, "a field promising a richer harvest it would be difficult to find." As Jesus put it, "Look, I tell you, lift up your eyes, and see that the fields are white for harvest" (John 4:35).

Our work in response, Jesus told us, must begin in prayer. "He said to his disciples, 'The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest" (Matthew 9:37-38). Prayer is key. Jesus tells us to pray before He even says, "Go." It was the great teacher on prayer, Dr. A.J. Gordon, who said, "You can do more than pray after you have prayed, but you cannot do more than pray until you have prayed."

The challenge of mission before us can be exhilarating...and overwhelming. Only the power of God released in prayer is sufficient to the task. As we start our life together in this new diocese, let's renew our commitment to make prayer central to all that we do. Pray for those you know who don't yet know the Lord. Pray for your congregation and its leaders. And please pray for me, as well.

"Continue steadfastly in prayer, being watchful in it with thanksgiving. At the same time, pray also for us, that God may open to us a door for the word, to declare the mystery of Christ" (Colossians 4:2-3).
