Dear Friends,

As I follow the pattern of Bible reading in the daily Lectionary, I've been this week with the Apostle Paul as he writes from prison to his beloved church in Philippi. While Paul doesn't say from *which* prison cell he was writing (it could have been Caesarea, where he spent two years, Acts 23:23-26:32; or Rome, Acts 28:11-31), I was struck yet again by his willingness and faith-given ability to see what has befallen him as being God's gift for the spread of the Kingdom.

From his cell, he could write in 1:12, "I want you to know, brothers, that what has happened to me has really served to advance the gospel..." What an astonishing statement, one that reflects supernatural trust and insight to see past hardship and apparent defeat into the purposes of God.

He then explains how God has used his imprisonment: "...so that it has become known throughout the whole imperial guard and to all the rest that my imprisonment is for Christ." I can picture Paul witnessing to his jailers, converting one after another. His guards came to realize that the one they held in chains was truly free in Christ, and they who had earthly power were in fact the ones bound by sin.

The congregation in Philippi, to which Paul was writing, knew this story well. Look again at Acts 16 and recall how that church was planted. Paul's preaching and deliverance of a demon-possessed slave girl resulted in his being thrown into prison. He and his companion Silas were flogged and chained in stocks, yet they sang hymns to the Lord into the night. Their witness under affliction led to the conversion of the Philippian jailer.

Now Paul was writing to that jailer and the other Christians in Philippi. How they must have rejoiced to hear that Jesus was doing it again, using imprisonment for the spread of the liberating Gospel of Christ.

Our movement has taken a costly stand for Jesus Christ and the truth of His Word. Clergy and congregations have sacrificed much. Yet everywhere I go, I hear the same refrain: "We are better off for what we have experienced. We are more committed to Christ, we have gone deeper in the Scriptures, we are more passionate about mission, we are more engaged in planting new churches and reaching new people with the Gospel."

Amazing.

As we formally launch the new Diocese of the Mid-Atlantic on Saturday, let's give renewed thanks to our gracious Lord for all that He has done through what we have experienced. And, with the Apostle Paul, let's be confident that He who began a good work in us will bring it to completion at the day of Christ Jesus (Philippians 1:6).

A Healing Reflection

The following is a reflection from a member of last year's Wednesday Healing Class at The Falls Church. More details about the class can be found under Events & Announcements below.

Reflecting on the changes I've experienced since I started preparing last summer for the Healing Class last fall, I can say that by God's grace, I have come a measureable distance. Having been so blessed, this leper must return and say, "Thank you."

My interest in the class was catalyzed into action after I attended the MacNutt conference in May 2010. Very concerned about the woundedness in my family, I felt led in prayer to apply for admission to the class. I was not at all sure I would qualify. I figured some degree of true holiness was probably a good qualification for someone who would go mucking about other people's souls, and I could certainly not be accused of advanced holiness.

[As I participated in the class], the precious Holy Spirit would ever so kindly shine His light into (yet) another corner and say, with a twinkle in His eye, "Well, my, my - what's this?" More debris, more accumulated sludge. And a lot of pain – held up to the cross and awaiting healing.

I received a major healing about a family member, transforming my response to that person. I embarked on a major

campaign of forgiveness, touring through vast episodes of my history as the faithful Hound of Heaven would suddenly stop and point. By this time, I was completely sold. No holdbacks. Whatever had been done to me, it did not matter, I wanted to forgive them, and get more of that grime out of my soul. God was truly faithful to continue to point me out yet another period in my life where I had debts unpaid, uncovered by the blood of Jesus in my experience, and stinking to Heaven. It began to seem that my sin in unforgiveness and bitter root judgments might be of equal weight to that of the hurt received, and that I only needed to look at the hurt long enough to see my sin in it. What was done to me seemed to not be as important as it might have earlier. Being obedient seemed like the most important thing, and I felt compelled to follow that leading.

Archbishop Duncan to Preach at The Falls Church on 9/11

The head of the Anglican Church in North America, Archbishop Robert Duncan, will be at The Falls Church (115 E. Fairfax Street in Falls Church, VA) on September 11th commemorating the 10th anniversary of 9/11. Archbishop Duncan will be preaching at the 9:00 and 11:00 am ET Sunday morning services in the main sanctuary. A podcast and transcript of the sermon will also be made available on The Falls Church website following the event.

The Rev. Philip Bottomley has announced his retirement as pastor of The Church of St. Peter and St. Paul, after six years of serving a unique merger of an Anglican (St. Peter's) and a Lutheran (St. Paul) congregation in Roanoke. The Rev. Bottomley was born and raised in England and in 1971 was ordained a priest in St. Paul's Church of England. He became a Director of the Church's ministry among the Jews (CMT). In 1984 he accepted a call to become the first National Director of that ministry in the United States and served in that capacity until 1991. He continued serving as an Episcopal priest until after the church's debacle and his resignation in 2005. In 2006 he was invited to lead in the formation of a new church body, uniting Anglican and Lutheran doctrines. He became wellknown within the religious community and a strong advocate for the ecumenical movement. Under his guidance the two congregations have united in the mission of bringing others to know Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord. With deep regrets the congregation has accepted his resignation and vows to continue on the path he has forged. Rev. Bottomley and his wife, Sylvia, will be moving to Pennsylvania to be closer to their family.
