Dear Friends,

I'm writing this early in the morning on the Feast of St. Luke the Evangelist, October 18. We owe a tremendous debt of gratitude to Luke for his writing of both the Gospel of Luke and the Book of Acts.

His introduction to the Gospel shows us intention and his method:

"Inasmuch as many have undertaken to compile a narrative of the things that have been accomplished among us, just as those who from the beginning were eyewitnesses and ministers of the word have delivered them to us, it seemed good to me also, having followed all things closely for some time past, to write an orderly account for you, most excellent Theophilus, that you may have certainty concerning the things you have been taught." (Luke 1:1-4 ESV)

Luke conducted careful historical research, including study of both the earlier written accounts of Jesus' life and the reports of eyewitnesses. He was a scientist (Paul calls him "the beloved physician" in Colossians 4:14) and his precision and concern for accuracy come through clearly. He wanted his readers to know the truth and to be confident that it is the truth. The Greek word for "certainty" in verse 4 is asphaleia, from which we get our word, "asphalt." Luke was a first-rate historian and he wanted us to be firm and solid in our knowledge of the truth based

on fact.

But Luke was also a fine theologian. His introduction to the Acts of the Apostles (as it has been known since Bishop Irenaeus of Lyons called it that in the 2ndcentury) says this:

"In the first book, O Theophilus, I have dealt with all that Jesus began to do and teach, until the day when he was taken up, after he had given commands through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen. He presented himself alive to them after his suffering by many proofs, appearing to them during forty days and speaking about the kingdom of God." (Acts 1:1-3 ESV)

Luke was concerned that we know the meaning of the historical facts. He wanted us to understand what Jesus taught and its significance. He was eager to point out that, while Jesus' work of salvation was accomplished on the Cross, Jesus' ministry continues through His Church by the Holy Spirit. That's why he says that the Gospel of Luke, which he considered to be "Volume 1," dealt only with what Jesus began to do and teach. The Book of Acts, Volume 2, contains what Jesus continued to do and teach through His followers in the power of the Spirit.

In honor of Saint Luke, would you stop and read a chapter from either the Gospel of Luke or the Book of Acts? And then give thanks to God for this Evangelist and his faithful witness to the truth that is in Jesus Christ.

Nominations Reqested: Constitution and Canons Committee and Ecclesiastical Trial Court

The Committee on Nominations is actively seeking nominations (due Oct. 24) for the following Diocesan positions as called for in our new Constitution and Canons, to be elected at our Diocesan Synod, November 18-19, 2011.

Ecclesiastical Trial Court: Nine persons will be elected—four lay persons and five clergy—for staggered three-year terms.

Constitution and Canons Committee: Nine persons will be elected for staggered three-year terms.

Provincial Council: Three persons will be elected—one clergy and two lay persons.

Provincial Assembly: Twenty persons will be elected—seven clergy, seven lay persons, and six youth (aged 16-26 years old).

Youth Delegates: Four youth delegates needed for Nov. 16-22.

Note that for all of these bodies, persons from all walks of life and with a variety of gifts and experience are needed.

All Saints' Dedicates New Building


All Saints' Church celebrated the dedication of their new building Friday through Sunday, October 7-9, 2011 starting with a classic car show and outdoor Christian band performances on Friday night. The car show included a variety of cars such as a 1930

Model A Roadster and a 2010 Dodge Challenger. Embrace the Flood, a band of All Saints' youth, was the first band to perform for a large crowd at an outdoor venuebehind the church. Other performers during the weekend included the Brother Sister Band, Addison Road, Shane and Shane, and Dan Morgan & Friends. Visitors from the local community came to participate and find out more about the new building. Kids played in "moonbounces" and there were tents with prayer teams available throughout the weekend.

The new facility was dedicated and consecrated on Saturday morning. The large congregation included local pastors and members of partner congregations, clergy from the Diocese, local dignitaries, as well as the engineers, lawyers, architects, and bankers who supported the construction of the new church. Amid joyful praise and worship, the Rt. Rev. John A. M. Guernsey consecrated the sanctuary, the altar, the pulpit and the organ. The Rev. Dan Morgan gave an inspiring sermon, reminding the congregation that the new

building is a starting point for sharing God's love and healing power in the community, not the finish line of a building project.

At our parish retreat, our teacher Jeff Black, reminded us that we are called to exhibit both grace and truth in our ministries. Jesus seldom preached the truth first. As John wrote "grace and truth came through Jesus Christ" (1:17). According to the other gospel writers, grace preceded truth. Jesus would heal the blind man, feed the hungry, exorcise the demoniac THEN tell them the good news of the kingdom. This is the Jesus' Way of evangelism: Grace and Truth. Grace BEFORE Truth. As sinners, we all need openness to truth. Grace opens us to truth.

As we ask God to show us how to share His love with those who don't know it, we must be open to demonstrating grace in people's point of need and pain. There is seldom a site of pain and need greater in people, than in their families and marriages.

Our conference this fall on relationships is designed to equip us (and other churches) with ministries of grace that can bear the weight of truth. As we minister to people in the difficulties of making their marriages work and helping them to be better parents, we are earning a hearing for the Gospel.
